Or well-know as MFF is partnership programme to promote the coastal ecosystem investment for the sustainability development. MFF has created collaboration from the countries, sectorial and institution/organization in the MFF region to address the develops of coastal area. MFF uses the mangrove as ecosystem flagship as forest mangrove important roles do decrease the Hindi ocean tsunami impact 2004. also their impact especially in the coastal livelihood because of mangrove's loss or degradation.

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MFF began in 2006 by engaging the countries worst-affected by the Indian Ocean Tsunami: Indonesia, India, Maldives, Sri Lanka, Seychelles, Thailand., Pakistan and Vietnam. MFF has three main objectives, they are:

1. Improve, Share and apply knowledge to support the conservation, restoration and sustainable use of coastal ecosystem
2. Strengthen Integrated Coastal management institutions and empower civil society (including local communities) to engage in decision-making and management that conserves, restores and sustainably uses coastal ecosystems.
3. Enhance coastal governance at all levels (regional, national, provincial, district and community) to encourage integrated management programmes and investments that are ecologically and socio-economically sound, and promote human well-being and security.

Three objectives was interpreted more detail into 15 MFF Programmes of Work which was used for the media communication and knowledge within the partnership.

MFF Implementation at Indonesia

The implementation for PoW of MFF Indonesia starting since 2010, it was managed and monitor by the NCB (National Collaboration Body) who representative from the some ministry (lead by Bappenas), mangrove expert, International NGO and mangrove research center. NCB was also created the National Strategy and Action Plan (NSAP) as national guidance to implementing the MFF project which synchronized with the national priority. In the process, mechanism MFF implementation was applied using the grant project both in Small Grant Facility (SGF) with the budget between US\$ 10,000 — 25,000 and Large Grant Facility with the budget between US\$ 50,000 — 100,000 for the local NGOs, communities institution/organization etc.

The SGF phase-1 of MFF Indonesia was implemented in four location, they are:

1. Jakarta Green Monster di Muara Angke (4 May 2010 - 4 July 2011)
2. Mitra Bahari at Pesantren Village, Pemalang, Central Java (4 May 2010 - 4 April 2011)
3. Community Based Disaster Risk Management— Nahdatul Ulama (CBDRM-NU) at Brondong Village, Lamongan, East Java (4 May 2010 - 4 December 2010)
4. Community Research and Development Institution (IPPM) at Makassar, South Sulawesi (4 May 2010 - 20 April 2011)

While the LGF phase-1 was implemented by:

1. Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries collaborate with the local government at Central Java and Diponegoro University (UNDIP - Semarang) at Demak, Jawa Tengah (1 November 2011 - October 2013)

Implementation Result from SGF Phase-1

The Implementation of MFF Indonesia with SGF phase-1 show that the result have addresses the main objective. Within 18 months process of SGF then it can bridge the NSAP concept and match with the cross-cutting issues. It was documented as i) gender equality by Mitra Bahari, ii) costal management by IPPM, iii) climatic change adaptation in the costal area by CBDRM-NU , iv) waste management as income alternative by JGM (clock wise: upper left, upper right, lower right, lower left)



The implementation result for the SGF phase-1 was expected as good lesson-learn for the regional, national and another district area especially in the coastal ecosystem and for all MFF countries members as well.

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
